ristic <u>Holy Hour</u>. Holy Hours are the Roman Catholic devotional tradition of spending an hour in Eucharistic Adoration in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. The Holy Hour begins at 7:00 p.m. with the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, accompanied by brief prayer and song. Saint Peter Claver: "The Slave of the Slaves Forever"


On September 9th, the Catholic Church celebrates the Memorial of Saint Peter Claver. Peter Claver was born in Spain in 1581. His parents were farmers. Peter joined the Jesuit religious order. (This is the same religious order that founded Xavier University and St. Xavier High School here in Cincinnati.)

Peter was encouraged to follow his vocation of being a missionary to the New World. As a young novice, he left his homeland and became a missionary in Cartagena (which is in what is now the country of Columbia in South America). He was ordained a priest there in 1615.

Cartagena was a bustling city, but it was the primary center for the slave trade in the New World. Every year, thousands of slaves from West Africa arrived at this port. Because of the inhumane conditions on the slave ships, many of these West Africans died during the sea voyage, and many others arrived at Cartagena in serious condition. Peter Claver recognized the human dignity of each one of these persons and became their advocate. He would meet the slave ships, and bring water, food, medicine, and clothing to the West African slaves. He tended their wounds and taught them about the love of God. Peter would also preach in the city square and to plantation owners. But he never accepted the hospitality of the plantation owners, staying instead in the slave quarters with the West Africans he cared for so deeply.

Peter Claver declared himself the "slave of the slaves forever." He also would often say that that "We must speak to them with our hands before we try to speak to them with our lips."

Peter became ill and died a few years later in the year 1654. He was canonized a Saint in 1888. He is Patron of Columbia and all missions to black peoples.

The Most Holy Name of Mary

On September 12th the Church celebrates the feast (optional memorial) of the Most Holy Name of Mary. This celebration is a recent addition to the Universal Roman Calendar.

Why would we celebrate the name of Mary? Primarily because God is glorified by Mary's role in salvation history. The glory belongs to God! In the beautiful canticle the Magnificat, Mary, herself, proclaims that all generations will call her blessed. Why? Because God has looked upon her lowliness and done great things for her. In this song, Mary clearly announces that God's name is holy. (See Luke 1:46-55)

Does it still seem odd to have a feast day celebrating a name? Not at all! Recall that in former times, and still to this day in many cultures, a person's name day (the Feast Day of their Patron Saint) is far more important and widely celebrated than their birthday.

So on September 12th celebrate the Most Holy Name of Mary, and don't forget to send a special Feast Day greeting to all the Marys in your life, as well!
